

# **Slow Down for Our Children:**

# A Critical Reminder for Every Motorist



Every day across South Australia, hundreds of children step onto and off of school buses—trusting that the world around them will slow down long enough to keep them safe.

Despite clear laws stating that motorists must reduce their speed to 25 km/h when passing a stationary school bus with flashing lights, countless drivers continue to speed past, oblivious to the danger they pose to our most precious passengers.

#### What You Can Do:

- Slow down to 25 km/h when approaching a stationary school bus with flashing amber lights.
- Share this message with friends and family—especially new or young drivers.
- Be the reason a child makes it home safely.

Let's not wait for tragedy to spur action. Because by then, it will already be too late.

One long-serving local school bus operator recently shared a chilling account:

"I vividly recall a moment when a child stood in the middle of the highway while cars sped past at full speed, showing no signs of slowing down. That image has never left me."

And nor should it leave any of us, these buses carry our children, not cargo.

The law exists to protect them.

And as parents, carers, educators, and community members, we must ensure this important message reaches every motorist.
